Mr. T. W. Russell—The Irish Creameries and Dairy Produce Bill, which passed its second reading in the House of Lords on the 11th June, is, as regards its main features, in substantial agreement with the views expressed by the Irish Butter Trade Association, and the Irish Creamery Managers' Association, and the Irish Agricultural Organisation Society. All sections of the trade in Ireland appear to be satisfied as to the advantages to be conferred by the bill. Representations for its modification have been submitted by the Irish Agricultural Organisation Society, who desire the amendment of some clauses of the bill. With a view to meeting some of the points raised by the Society, certain amendments will be proposed on behalf of the Government at the Committee stage of the Lill in the House of Lords. It is hoped to take the Committee stage in the House of Lords before the end of the present month, and, if at all possible, to have the bill in the House of Commons before the House adjourns for the summer recess.
