DEATH OF MR. SAMUEL ARTHUR BLENNERHASSETT.

The sympathy of very many friends in city and county is extended to Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Blennerhasset, County View Terrace, Ballina curra, on the death of their only child, Samuel Arthur Blennerhasset, who passed away on the night of the 18th instant at 15 Birch Road, Crumppall, Manchester, after a brief illness. Deceased, who was only in his 19th year, was intended for the Church. After a brilliant course of study at Villiers School he entered Trinity College, Dublin, in November, 1911, and already gave proof of his scholastic abilities and talents here, having in March last won a first prize, getting 100 per cent. in one subject, and 90 per cent. on the whole. A few weeks ago he went on his holidays to Crumppall, and while there contracted pneumonia, to which he succumbed on Thursday night, despite all that medical skill and the loving care of relatives could do. The cutting short at the threshold of manhood of a life full of hope and promise is particularly sad, and has occasioned the deepest regret of the deceased young gentleman's companions in this city, who entertained for him the highest affection and regard. Mr. and Mrs. Blennerhasset have been in receipt of numerous telegrams and letters of sympathy, including one from the Protestant Young Men's Association of which the deceased had been a member from an early age. The wire stated "Extremely sorry sad news. Warmest sympathy from Association—Galbraith." The interment took place on Saturday in the Southern Cemetery, Manchester, Mr. Blennerhasset father of the deceased and other relatives being amongst the chief mourners. Wreaths were sent by the father and mother, uncle and aunt, "Jessie," and "Victor," Mr. H. B. Alton, and the staff, 76, George Street, Limerick. Rev. Canon Waller preaching on Sunday morning in Trinity Church referred to the sad death of Samuel Blennerhasset, who, from childhood had attended the Church and Sunday School where he obtained all the special prizes in all classes. His course in Trinity College had just commenced, and all looked forward to a life of usefulness, when he was suddenly called away out of this world. The congregation expressed their deep sympathy with the bereaved parents who had been so long and intimately connected with Trinity Church.

FUNERAL OF MRS McNEICE

This afternoon the remains of the late Mrs. Elizabeth McNeice whose death took place at Harbour View Terrace, on Saturday, were interred in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. COUNTY BOROUGH VOTERS' LISTS

The lists of Parliamentary voters and the Local Government supplements for the year 1912-13 were posted outside the Town Hall yesterday, and will remain there during some days for the inspection of all concerned. The total number of voters exceeds 6,000, including those on the supplemental lists, something like 1,500, but there are several persons on both lists objected to, and applications will be received up to the 3rd prox. from persons claiming to be on the list of voters, and whose names are not inserted thereon. Last year the number of voters, including those on the supplemental lists, was 7,018, and when the Town Clerk, Mr. Wm. M. Nolan, J.P., has completed thereunto this year, it will, in all probability, be found that there will be very little change in the numerical voting strength of the constituency. Since writing the above it has been ascertained that the exact number for this year are 6,993.

"LIVE" WIRE ACCIDENT.

Christopher Bennett, employed at one of the local provision stores, was injured last night while at work, through a live electric wire accidentally hitting him on the head and hand. The wire, it is stated, fell from its position, striking Bennett on the forehead and burning one of his hands. He was removed to Barrington's Hospital in the ambulance, and was detained. This morning he had recovered from the effects of the accident, and was accordingly enabled to leave the institution.

CASTLEDAWSON AFFAIR.

Prosecution at Petty Sessions. Yesterday, thirty-eight men, thirty of whom are Nationalists and eight Unionists were charged at Petty Sessions at Castledawson with riotous and disorderly conduct on the occasion of an alleged attack on a Sunday school excursion party.

The evidence of a clergyman, who accompanied the Sunday school party, was that as they were returning to the train, they met a big party of the Ancient Order of Hibernians. A Union Jack, which was carried by a schoolboy, was seized, and in a moment a number of the Hibernians burst into the Sunday school party, and slashed at them with pikes which they carried. Some Protestants ran out from Castledawson to protect the Sunday school children, and a fight, in which stones were thrown, occurred on the roadside. The cross-examination of the witness was directed to show that the waving of flags by the school children knocked off the caps of some of the Hibernians, but this was denied, as was a statement that party expressions were used by some of the school party.

The hearing of the cases was resumed to-day.
