Scott said the directors had evidently been in satisfying the trading community and shareholders. He moved about among the shareholders, and by them the increased dividend was viewed with great pleasure, and acceptable. The report of the directors was a admirable one, and well calculated to satisfy the trading community and the public. The chairman declared the resolution adopted. J. Julian said it afforded him very great pleasure to propose the following resolution—“The best thanks of the meeting be given to the directors of the bank and its officers for their services during the past half-year.” O’Sullivan seconded the motion.

The chairman, in supporting the motion, said that the success of any bank depended on courtesy and attention of the officials. He thought they should advance their interests as far as possible. As regards the Irish staff, it was well known that the staff were paid in proportion to the importance of their duties. The scale of salaries was rather low. The increased cost of living and the difficulty in which the staff moved rendered it necessary that they should have more substantial

opposition was passed unanimously. The chairman said at the end of the meeting that the directors went through the salaries of the officials in the bank, and fully considered it in most cases they were increased every year. There was no official in the bank whose salary was not discussed and looked at by the Board every year. On behalf of himself and his fellow-directors he begged to thank the directors for their kind resolution. He hoped that they would continue to deserve their thanks for the future. They certainly did their best for themselves and the shareholders. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. Standish Harris said on behalf of the shareholders he begged to thank them for their resolution. The meeting then ended.

DOCTOR'S WIFE KILLED.

A shocking driving fatality occurred near the town of Le Gros Welsh, wife of Dr. W. P. M.O., Clogheen. Madame Walshe, accompanied by her sons, was driving from the residence of Mr. Walter Nolan, Clerk of the Peace, Garnavilla, when the horse became unmanageable, with the result that she was run up on a heap of stones and capsized.
