SUFFRAGETTE DISTURBANCES.

Influential Protest.

Lord Haldane, Sir E. Grey, Lord Robert Cecil, Lady Selborne, and others addressed last night a communication to the Press deeply deploring that when the friends of suffrage should be endeavouring to take advantage of the opportunity offered by the Premier for some measure of enfranchisement for women by the insertion of amendments into the Franchise Bill the Women's Social and Political Union should have promulgated a provocative and bellicose declaration. The communication concludes; "If the Women's Social and Political Union proceed to further violence, we can only regard them as more attached to their own methods than to the good of the cause and as being in effect its worst enemies."

Mr. Chamberlain, in a letter read at a Tariff Reform meeting at Bristol on Saturday, wrote:—"Tariff Reform is gaining, and its success is assured at no distant date. We have much uphill work to face, but I do not doubt that the result will reward those who are labouring in the cause."
