Man Arrested.

A Press Association telegram says:—The Galway police have detained a man on suspicion in connection with the murder of Miss M'Gorry, a teacher, whose body was found near Galway on Thursday.

The Inquest.

An inquest was held at Galway last night on the remains of Miss Sarah McGorey. A police sergeant described finding the body in the long grass 60 yards from the road. There was a razor case near by and an empty purse, while a blood stained razor was found in the canal some distance away. Dr. Colahan said the murder must have been committed several days before. A verdict of wilful murder against some person or persons unknown was returned.

RESIGNATION OF THE CITY HIGH CONSTABLE.

The resignation of the City High Constable, Mr. James Forrest, at the last meeting of the Borough Council, and after a service in various capacities, under the Limerick Corporation, for something over half a century, deserves public recognition. Fifty years is an extended period, even in the life of a municipal body, and in this particular instance it extends over a limit full of local interest, and including events which find their place in the history of the country. The period in question brings us close up to the time of what were known as the old or unreformed Corporations of Ireland; and from that now far off date down to this year of the twentieth century, the moving incidents which have taken place in Limerick, are and should be unusually interesting, even to a stranger from far or near. Mr. Forrest had experience of all them, and when the story was to be told in part or in larger measure none could do it more clearly, intelligently, or more racy. He was, apart from his personality, popular with all classes, a good officer, and one who on more than occasion received recognition in the city and from outside for merit and bravery in protecting life and property in Limerick. Numerous instances could be given also of his social popularity, and it is safe to say that now that he has retired from office, at a ripe age, into private life he carries with him the best wishes of the citizens of every section of the community.
