

The Secretary—I don't think it is necessary to read it. It draws attention to the necessity of having the point lighted.

Alderman Joyce considered that the Board would place themselves in a very awkward position if they applied to have the light removed. If a deep ship struck the bank, it would place them in a position of disadvantage. That was his opinion on the matter.

The Mayor—And we will readily accept your opinion.

Alderman Joyce—What does the Harbour Master say? I think at the same time we ought to express the opinion that the letter of the Irish Lights Commissioners is not satisfactory. They give no reason for the delay of 18 months.

The Harbour Master instanced the case of Scatterry light where the delay was considerable.

The Secretary thought it would be better to have the light renewed.

Alderman Joyce said the best thing for Messrs. Glynn & Sons to do was to have a question asked in the House of Commons about the matter by the member for West Clare, but if the Harbour Board wished he would put a question when Parliament reassembled.

The Secretary was instructed to write the Irish Lights Commissioners informing them that the Board considered it would be better to have the light renewed.

#### PILOTAGE RATES.

With reference to the order made by the Board in September last, calling upon Pilot Charles Hanrahan to pay a sum of £5 6s. 2d. to the Western pilots out of the fees obtained by him for taking a steamer from Fenit to the mouth of the Shannon, a communication was received from Pilot Hanrahan declining to comply with the order, as only Scatterry rates were payable.

The Secretary explained that the reason the question had not come on before now was in consequence of the illness of Pilot Hanrahan. The Board had already decided that the Western pilots were entitled to the money.

Alderman Joyce—Did the Board make that order?

The Secretary—Yes.

The Harbour Master said Pilot Hanrahan was still in impaired health, and in the circumstances it was decided to allow the question stand for two months.

The meeting then adjourned.
