

their duty, no matter which Government were in power. I say the Irish Party are not doing their duty by their constituents. (Hear, hear).

The Chairman said that Alderman Joyce had stated that the Irish Party had done their best in the matter.

Mr. Donnellan—But it is what I say, they have not. If they did we would not have the whole country proscribed.

The following resolution was then unanimously adopted on the proposition of Mr. T. Donnellan—
That we desire to call the attention of the Irish members of Parliament to the great want that exists in the law with regard the restrictions in Ireland for prevention of foot and mouth disease. While England has only a few counties the whole of Ireland is proscribed, and we are of opinion that the southern counties of Ireland which are free from disease ought to be placed on the same footing as the free English areas, and that our Irish members ought to insist on this."

ENNIS UNION.

After some conversation, Mr. Hegarty warmly declared if they took them in he would send the boots and the standard sample to the Local Government Board.

Mr. Meade—You may do what you like after that.

Mr. McHugh seconded Mr. Meade. The boots were causing more trouble than anything else.

Chairman—Why don't the contractors supply them up to the standard sample? I have them rejected any way.

Mr. Meade—You should not reject them without taking the sense of the Board.

The order remained unchanged.

ARMY VETERAN DEAD.

The Chairman asked if an old army veteran named Hayes had died recently in the house.

The Master replied in the affirmative.

The Chairman—Had you any information that he would be buried through any other source than the Union?

The Master—No.

The Chairman produced a letter which he said was from another army veteran, stating that £4 would be obtained for the purpose of burying Crimean veterans when they died in Workhouses. When did Hayes die?

The Master replied on Sunday.

The Clerk read an official communication, which bore out the Chairman.

Relieving Officer Carmody said he had never heard of such a grant on the death of Crimean veterans in workhouses.

The Master was ordered to take a copy of the letter for his future guidance.
