The Press Association's special representative at Dover telephones that the optimistic reports of the location of the wrecked submarine prove to be unfounded. A diver last night thought he had discovered part of the hull of the submarine. Divers were down for three hours this morning, and on returning reported that what their confrere had believed to be the submarine was really a rock. Sweeping operations for the wreck are now again proceeding. It is not expected that even if located, it will be possible to bring the ill-fated vessel to the surface to-day. Low tides, favourable for salvage work, will continue for three days.

THE FATALITY IN WEST LIMERICK.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

Dr. John M. Ambrose (Coroner), held an inquest on Thursday into the circumstances of the death of Mr. Morgan Breen, whose body was found in a ditch at Glenbarron, on the 1st October.

Sergeant Butler, Glin, represented the Consta- bulary, and Mr. Michael O'Connor was foreman of the jury.

Mr. Roger Behane, D.C., deposed that he was passing the place about 7.30 p.m., on the lat- inst., when he saw the upturned cart in the dyke of the road. He tried to lift the car but was not able, and he got three other men and they lifted it off and found Mr. Breen under it. The man was dead. There were injuries.

Mr. Maurice Windle, publican, Carrickerry, deposed to deceased calling at his house some short distance away some time previously to the body being found. He wanted some shop goods which he had not at the time. He was quite sober. There were others there at the time.

Dr. McDonnell, Glin, who examined the remains deposed to the nature of the injuries.

The Coroner said it was a very sad and a very clear case of accidental death. He said this road was a death trap, and the people of the locality should assemble at the meeting of the Glin Council and demand that it should be put into a safe condition forthwith. One life was more important than whatever the cost of making the road would be.

Mr. Behane said the state of this part of the road was brought before the Glin Road Sessions, and while all agreed as to its dangerous condition nothing was done, as the cost would be so great.

The jury returned a verdict of death from nervous shock, the result of injuries received in an accident.

The funeral of the deceased took place from the parish church at Glin (where the remains had lain overnight) to the burial place in Killfergus, and was attended by the people of the parish and the several adjoining parishes.

A GENEROUS OFFER.

THE DAIRY INDUSTRY.

Rosbrien, seconded, and it was unanimously resolved:—"That the County Limerick Farmers Association observe with surprise the County of Limerick which is the leading county in Ireland is not represented on the Dairy Industry Advisory Committee on the Dairy Industry appointed by the Department of Agriculture, and suggest that two representatives from the County of Limerick be added to the Advisory Committee in question."

A conversation took place as to opening up the cattle trade with Germany, in view of the shortage of meat in that country, and it was decided to write to the German Consul in Dublin on the subject.
