GREAT MUNSTER FAIR.

The Great Munster Horse Fair to-day, the principal one of the year, was well supplied with animals, and buyers were in attendance from most of the home and cross channel markets. The result was that a large volume of business was done, and that on the whole prices were good where purchases were made. Hunters and weight carriers and army horses were most sought after, and in these classes the supply fell far short of the demand, which was brisk where anything suitable was on offer. Messrs. Rogers (Meath), Widger (Waterford), Murphy (do.), Hardy, Blandford, and Nugent (Dublin) were among the principal purchasers, and they did no small share of business, yesterday as well as to-day and at prices which were on the paying side for sellers. For hunters three figure prices were obtained, the prices for army horses ranging from £25 to £35 while yearlings went at all figures. There was a large share of business done at Mr. Fitt's Repository yesterday and again to-day, and some
