### HISTORY OF THE CRESCENT.

Though now regarded as essentially Mohanmedan, the Crescent was Christian in its origin (the Daily Chronicle points out). A crescent moon was the emblem of the Byzantine Empire and the Eastern Church, and the Turks adopted it as a badge of triumph after the capture of Constantinople in 1453. Before that the Crescent was common in the armorfal bearings of English knights, and as late as 1464, Rene. Duke of Anjou, founded an order of knights having as badge a crescent moon. Its use by the Turks, however, led to its abandonment by Christians, though in many Russian churches a crescent may shill be seen figuring beside the Cross, as a sign of the Bazantine origin of the Russian Church.
