Snow fell heavily throughout North West Thursday night, blocking the mountain and rendering outdoor work impossible.

The Peak district of Derbyshire is now there being a fall of from four to six inches. Snowstorms in East Yorkshire on Thursday night caused considerable damage, and telecommunication between Driffield and H interrupted.
