With reference to the resignation of Dr Hennessy, the Local Government Board wrote asking whether the resignation was complete, and requesting the Council to comply with the law. The Chairman said the resignation was complete. Dr Hennessy was receiving legal advice, and he was told that the Local Government Board were going beyond their rights in the matter. Mr. McGrath proposed, and Mr Bennett seconded, that the resignation be not accepted, and this was agreed to. The Council soon after adjourned.

SNOW IN ENGLAND.

Severe weather is being experienced in various parts of England: Snow fell heavily throughout North Wales on Thursday night, blocking the mountain roads and rendering outdoor work impossible. The Peak district of Derbyshire is snowbound, there being a fall of from four to six inches. Snowstorms in East Yorkshire on Thursday night caused considerable damage, and telegraphic communication between Driffield and Hull is interrupted. Trawlers arriving in the Tyne yesterday reported severe gales in the North Sea. The Shields boat Alexandra lost a member of the crew, washed overboard on Wednesday. A heavy fall of snow lasting several hours occurred in the Mansfield district yesterday, the roads being covered to a depth of several inches. In some places drifts occurred.

SERIOUS RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

A serious accident befel Head Porter Denis O'Dwyer at the railway terminus last night. Some time before the arrival of the Rosslare train at nine o'clock O'Dwyer was on his way to take duty when he was knocked down by the pilot engine. When picked up he was found to be in a dazed condition, and the Fire Brigade ambulance was telephoned for, as well as a clergyman. Having been attended to, he was taken to Barrington's Hospital where he complained of pains in the back. This morning the patient's condition was critical, and the medical staff will not be able to state definitely the nature of his injuries which are internal, for a day or two.

THE NEWQUAY MYSTERY.

Was it Mrs. Nowill?

A message received at Newquay, to-day, from the Wigan police states that a lady with luggage, labelled Mrs. Nowill, got out of the train there and proceeded by another train en route for Southport. Outside porters recognised her from the description and photo published. Mr. Nowill has telegraphed to the Southport police asking them to investigate. A Wigan telegram to the Press Association states that Mrs. Nowill had considerable jewellery with her and she probably would not lose sight of her luggage, assuming incident of the identity of the lady.

The magistrates decided to send the accused prison for a month on the charge of loitering, for assaulting the night constable he was ordered to be imprisoned for another month.

LARCENY OF LEAD.

Anne Doherty, Fish Lane, off Mary street, charged with the larceny of a quantity of lead valued for 5s. from an un-occupied house, property of Mr. Patrick Vaughan, of Corbally. From the evidence of Constable Keane, Sergeant Kennedy, and other witnesses, it appears that some lead pipings were cut down from walls of the house, and afterwards sold to McCarthy, general dealer, by the defendant. The defendant said she got the lead near Corbally Police Barrack. The magistrates were of opinion that the case was proved against the accused, and ordered that she be imprisoned for a calendar month.

ADJOURNED.

Stephen Doherty, husband of the defendant in the last case, was charged with the larceny of two roller window blinds from the same house. Constable Connor gave evidence of finding the two blinds (produced) in an attic in defendant's house. The case was adjourned for a fortnight, the defendant in the meantime being allowed to stand on bail.

CHARGE OF ASSAULTING NIGHT CONSTABLE.

Night Constable John Ryan charged two men (who did not appear), named Wm Allen and John Cantillon with assaulting him while in the discharge of his duties on Sunday morning last. The complaint's evidence went to show that at about 2.40 a.m. on the morning in question Cantillon demonstrated with the two defendants in O'Connell Avenue for singing. Cantillon struck him in the chest, and both made use of bad language towards him. Allen put his hands in his pockets, then buttoned his coat and told witness he should fight him. He then hit witness on the eye and split his eyelid. Witness said he believed that Allen had something in his hand at the time. Allen afterwards struck him on the chest and knocked him down. Witness' lip got split as the result of the assault. When the complaint was thrown down, Allen asked him was he beaten, and Inspector McNamara, who was there said they were beaten. Witness blew his alarm, and then the accused men walked away. The case was adjourned for the presence of Inspector McNamara.

STABBING CHARGE.

Mr. Craig, D.I., charged a young fellow named Henry Byrnes with stabbing and causing grievous bodily harm to one Mrs. Mullany, shopkeeper, Arthur's Quay, on a certain date in April last. From the evidence of Mrs. Mullany, it appeared that on the day she received the injury she found the accused emerging from a little parlour in her premises. She caught hold of him by the arm, and suddenly she felt a sharp pain in her wrist, and found that Byrnes had stabbed her with a knife deliberately. Since then the injury had caused her much trouble, and she was in hospital for some time. Mr. Craig, D.I., said the doctor's thought she would not recover at the time. The case was adjourned for twelve weeks.

A Manila telegram states a severe typhoon has crossed over the Island of Samar Layte and North Paary, doing great damage to property, and causing great loss of life. The damage is estimated to amount to several million pesos.
