## Riot Cases.

At the Special Assize for Ulster, opened at Londonderry to-day, there were six cases arising from outbreaks of party excitement, the chief being charges following the Park riots and the Castledawson iiot.

Mr. Justice Wright, addressing the Grand Jury, said they had nothin, to do with the political aspect of the cases, being concerned only with actions legally constituting a riot. The charges of manslaughter and cruelty against John George Crozier and his wife, the Judge described as very grave and serious.

# THE RECENT RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

#### Fatal Result.
