# FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT AT LIMBRICK.

## The Inquest.

An inquest was opened at Barrington's Hospital last evening by Mr. Coroner Barry, J.P., and a jury of which Mr. John Ormston was foreman. tunching the death of Deam O'Dwyer, head porter, at the Limerick Terminus of the U.S. and W.R., who was accidentally struck by a pilot engine on Friday, and died on Tu-sday evening in the Hospital. Deceased resided in Boherbooy district, was married, and had four children.

The inque t was adjourned till 12 o'clock to-day.

On hearing of the accident he came to Barrington's Hospital on the 39th of last mouth, and remained in attendance on his brother until his death. In reply to Mr. Moran, the witness said he had a conversation with his brother with regard to the accident. He said he was cousing down the line, and was reneated down by a pilot engine, which was without a buffer light. That he had no one to blame, and it the light was on he would have seen the engine. He lived near the level crussing, sort came to his work by the line, persission being given by the asperinteesident during the strike.

Dienti Carroll, Carry's Road, driver of the pilot engine was examined, and stated that he was on duty at five minutes to nine on the night of the

He was accompanied by a fireman, and when about fifteen yards frow the antrance to the rainsing abed he observed an object on the line, and pramptly applied his breaks. When he got the engine to a standaill, he came of the footbeard and found Head Porter O'Dwyer lying on the six-foot way. Seeing that he was hart he telephoned from the signal box for the ambalanca, doctor, and priest, and subsequently he was taken to hospital.
