**MUNSTER WINTER ASSIZES.**

**Charge of Using Explosives Near Nenagh.**

(BY TELEGRAPH FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)  
 Cork, Tuesday.  
 At the Munster Winter Assizes to-day, Hugh Hogan and John Whelan, labourers, residing near Nenagh, were charged with maliciously using explosives likely to endanger life and property, conspiracy to injure, and posting threatening notices. On 29th April John Doherty, Carravally, was awakened by a tremendous explosion, which set his out-house on fire. It was caused by a bomb made from a cigarette box. An exploded bomb was found at the place.  
 The evidence is circumstantial.

**LEINSTER ASSIZES.**

**Charge of Wife Murder.**

At the Leinster Assizes, Dublin, to-day, Hugh Jordan (72), was charged with the murder of his wife, aged 72, in a mountain cottage at Fuchsia-ferd, on November 19th. The woman was found dead, with a mass of wounds on the face. The prosecution suggested the motive of the crime was defendant's objection to the sale of the cottage.

**FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT AT LIMERICK.**

**The Inquest.**

An inquest was opened at Barrington's Hospital last evening by Mr. Coroner Barry, J.P., and a jury of which Mr. John Ormston was foreman, touching the death of Denis O'Dwyer, head porter, at the Limerick Terminus of the G.S. and W.R., who was accidentally struck by a pilot engine on Friday, and died on Tu-day evening in the Hospital. Deceased resided in Booterstown district, was married, and had four children. The inquest was adjourned till 12 o'clock to-day.

**THIS DAY.**  
 The inquest was resumed to-day. Head Constable Healy conducted the inquiry. Mr. J. H. Moran, solr., appeared for the next-of-kin; Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, represented the driver of the engine which knocked down deceased; and Mr. J. F. Miller, District Superintendent of the G.S. and W.R., were also present.  
 Philip O'Dwyer, Newtown, Co. Wick, brother of the deceased, identified the remains. On hearing of the accident he came to Barrington's Hospital on the 29th of last month, and remained in attendance on his brother until his death.  
 In reply to Mr. Moran, the witness said he had a conversation with his brother with regard to the accident. He said he was coming down the line, and was knocked down by a pilot engine, which was without a buffer light. That he had no one to blame, and if the light was on he would have seen the engine. He lived near the level crossing, and came to his work by the line, permission being given by the superintendent during the strike.  
 Denis Carroll, Curry's Road, driver of the pilot engine was examined, and stated that he was on duty at five minutes to nine on the night of the 29th ult. He was accompanied by a fireman, and when about fifteen yards from the entrance to the running shed he observed an object on the line, and promptly applied his brakes. When he got the engine to a standstill, he came off the forehead and found Head Porter O'Dwyer lying on the six-foot way. Seeing that he was hurt he telephoned from the signal box for the ambulance, doctor, and priest, and subsequently he was taken to hospital. The engine had the regulations light on—a red light in front, and a red on the rear.

To Mr. Moran—He was certain that the engine was lighted at the buffer at the time of the occurrence. His opinion of how the accident occurred was that the Waterford train was due at the time, and to get out of her way he stepped on to the pilot engine's line.  
 Answering Mr. O'Sullivan, the witness said part of his duty was to see that the lights were on the engine, and lighting, and on this occasion everything was correct in this respect.  
 Michael Dolan, Dickson's Place, fireman of the pilot engine, was the next witness, and stated when the accident occurred there were two red lights on the engine—one front and one rear.  
 Stephen Lynch, 33 Cecil street, signalman, in reply to Mr. O'Sullivan, stated he was in charge of the box where the accident occurred. The pilot engine had an excellent light; if she had not a light he would not allow her to stir an inch on the road.

Dr. Holmes, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, deposed to receiving the patient into the institution on the night of the 29th ult. He was then suffering from shock, and complained of pains in the back. There were abrasions of the hands and feet and contusions. He died on Tuesday last, and in witness's opinion death was due to peritonitis, due to contusion of the intestines and rupture of the liver.  
 This closed the enquiry, and Mr. Moran asked the jury to believe the words of the dying man that there was no buffer light on the engine.  
 Mr. O'Sullivan urged the jury to find that death was accidental, and that being so to exonerate the driver from culpability.  
 The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony, adding that the injuries sustained by deceased were caused by being knocked down by a pilot engine, and exonerating the driver of the locomotive from all blame.

**LISTOWEL MURDER CHARGE.**

Yesterday seven young men named Daniel McMahon, John Keane, James Mahony, Thomas Mason, Morgan Flaherty, Thomas O'Connor, and John Barry, were charged at Listowel with the murder of a returned Australian named Thomas Lyons of Islandannv. The case for the Crown was that Lyons was attacked by a number of men at the railway station, Listowel, on the night of the 22nd November, and that as a result of the ill-treatment which he received he died on the 29th November of last year. **HOME RULE BILL.**

**Position of Lord Lieutenant.**  
 In the House of Commons yesterday the discussion was resumed in Committee on the Home Rule Bill on the question of Appeal to the Privy Council from the Executive, but the Government refused an amendment giving powers to a Secretary of State, as well as the Lord Lieutenant, to refer such questions to the Privy Council. On the question of the status of the Lord Lieutenant, Mr. Asquith stated that the position was intended to be non-partisan and similar to that of the Governor-General of an overseas dominion.

**JURY OF WOMEN.**

**All Twelve Talking at Once.**  
 Telegraphing from New York on Tuesday, the correspondent of the Daily Mail says—The first jury of women in Kansas, where women were recently made eligible to serve in that capacity by a popular mandate, succeeded in settling yesterday a long-standing case on which a male jury failed to agree. "It seemed as if all twelve of us were talking at once," said one of the women afterwards. Several jurors wore hats throughout the trial. They each drew a fee of 10s., and they insisted on the removal of the spittoons which are provided for ordinary Kansas jurymen.
