**Funeral of Head Porter O'Dwyer.**

The funeral of Head Porter Denis O'Dwyer,  
 who died as the result of injuries sus-  
 tained in a recent accident at the Limerick  
 Terminus, took place on Thursday last for the  
 family burial ground at Oola. Deceased was a  
 native of Newtown, Oola, and the esteem in which  
 he was held was manifested by the extent of the  
 funeral, which was attended by the people from  
 his native parish and the surrounding parishes of  
 Templebreeden and Pallasgreen. The greatest  
 sympathy is felt by the general public for the

 aged about 40 years, which makes the sad  
 occurrence more painful, being cut off in the very  
 prime of life.
