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## ULSTER ASSIZES.

## **Charge of Riot at Moy.**

At the Ulster Assizes in Londonderry yesterday eleven men were put on trial charged with riot and assault on the police at Moy, Co. Tyrone, on 29th September, "Ulster Day." The case for the prosecution was that at night a crowd, numbering over a hundred, threw stones at a group of six or seven Nationalists, and smashed windows; revolver shots were fired, and the police were stoned and injured. The defence was that the Nationalists began the row by shouting party cries, and when evidence was heard for the defence the jury acquitted the prisoners.

## **DEATH OF MR. ANDREW HORN.**

Mr. Andrew Horn, of Waterford, passed away on Saturday night at his residence, Gortmore, Waterford, after a short illness. Under him and his father, John Horn, the iron shipbuilding and engineering industry flourished at Neptune Iron-works, Waterford, and the largest and finest vessels of the day, up to 330 feet in length and 4,000 tons deadweight, were built at the yard and launched into the narrow River Suir. He occupied a responsible and confidential position in the Waterford Steamship Company, Ltd., and its branch, the Limerick Steamship Company, Ltd., and also in the older firm of Malcolmson Bros., and carried out the duties of marine and engineer superintendent, and also of Lloyd's Surveyor for the Port of Waterford. Though retired from active life, he continued to take an active interest in all engineering and shipping matters. He was nephew to William Horn, whose name should be well known to all engineers as patentee of the, at one time, universally used wood condenser ferrules.

## **DEAR MEAT INDUSTRY.**

A special meeting of the County Limerick Farmers' Association will be held in the George Hotel on Saturday to discuss the feasibility of establishing a dead meat industry in the county. The subject was before the last meeting of the Association, when a volume of opinion was forthcoming as to the likelihood of an industry of the sort being successful. The question of an all the year supply seems to be the obstacle to be encountered, but there are many practical farmers of opinion that this could be surmounted in a county like Limerick, which ships more cattle annually than any other county in Ireland.

## **THE CITY GAS WORKS.**

The Special Committee of the Borough Council who are inquiring into the working of the Gas Concerns met in the Gas Office last evening. Alderman McNicoe presided. Also present—Councillors D. Griffin, M. O'Brien, and P. F. McNamee, with the Town Clerk and the Gas Secretary. The Committee practically concluded their investigations, which have been proceeding for some months past, these having reference, in the main, to the contracts entered into for coal in several years, and at the close the meeting adjourned until next Monday, when the report to be made to the Council will be considered, with a view to its adoption.

## **STREET COLLISION.**

While driving through the Crescent this afternoon a motor-car, No. 1 U 152, came into collision with a common cart conveying a load of sugar to the railway. In the impact the motor was badly damaged, the wind-screen being completely shattered, and the horse was knocked down. Beyond this, neither driver sustained any injury.
