# FATALITY AT LIMERICK ASYLUM.

Mr. J. F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, held an inquest on Saturday evening at the Limerick death of a patient in the institution named

Dr. O'Neil, Resident Medical Superintendent, stated the patient died at one o'clock on Friday. death being due to an irritant poison, Jeyes' fluid, which the man must have drunk. He was called to see Keegh on Thursday morning, when Dr. Irwin, the Assistant Medical Superintendent, had the patient under treatment. Everything possible was done for Keogh from the time the case was reparted until death took place the following

Dr. Irwin, Assistant Medical Superintendent, gave corrolative evidence.

Michael Neville, attendant, said he went a duty at six o'clock on Thursday morning, and had Keegh in charge until a quarter to ten o'clock, when Keogh and the other patients passed to the charge of Wm. Bourke, anothr attendant. Witness had some Jeyes' fluid with him, but he kept

ness had some Jeyes fluid with him, but he kept it locked in a tox. Save his breakfast, Keogh fook no food or drink while under his charge.

Wm. Bourke, male attendant, said he took over Keogh, as stated, and about half-past ten oe found Keogh unconscious in a lavatory and partially prose. Witness had used Jeyes' fluid in the lavatory about ten o'clock. There was no one present. It, was mived with restaurant. no one present. It was mixed with water, and witness immediately after locked the fluid in his

press. He used about two glasses of the fluid.
In answer to Dr. () Neill, the witness said he remembered him inspecting the place after halfpast ten on Thursday morning.

In reply to the Coroner, Dr. O'Neill stated

if the fluid were diluted as stated, what they got from the patient would not cause death.

The jury wound that death resulted from shock and collapse by taking an irritant poison, but there was no evidence to show deceased came by

Head Constable Healy conducted the inquiry on the part of the authorities.
