Jury Disagree.

After proceedings extending over nine days, the special jury engaged upon the libel action, in which three plaintiffs claimed damages from the Belfast Evening Telegraph on the ground of alleged libel connected with the Belfast riots, failed to agree yesterday, and were discharged. Mr. Justice Kenny summed up in less than two hours. The jury were rather more than that time in Jeliberating. When they returned into court the foreman said that he saw no possibility, after all points had been carefully considered, of their arriving at a conclusion. His lordship and counsel for the plaintiffs agreed that there was no use in longer detaining them, and they were discharged.
