THE LORD CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Lord Chief Justice of Ireland, on taking his seat yesterday in the King's Bench Court No. 1, to hear motions, seeing Mr. Denis Henry, K.C., in Court, said he hoped he had not any case of a protracted character to bring before him, as he intended leaving the country for a holiday of probably a couple of months' duration, acting on the advice of his medical attendant. He hoped to proceed on his leave of absence when the weather improved.

Mr. Henry, K.C., said he had only a very simple motion. He sincerely hoped that his lordship would return quite restored to health.

LIMERICK ORCHESTRAL SOCIETY.

The Limerick Orchestral Society has been making good progress since its formation a couple of months ago. Mr. P. J. Bellins is the conductor, and has under his baton many talented local lady and gentlemen amateurs, and when at full strength the band at present numbers about 40 members. Rehearsals are held weekly at the Thomond Hall, George Hotel. Haydn's Symphony in D., and the Overture to "The Merry Wives of Windsor" (Nicolaï), have been already started, while other pieces are being put into rehearsal. It is the intention of the Society to give a grand Orchestral Concert after Easter.

THE LATE MR. R. COSTELLOE, D.C.

The monthly meeting of the Limerick No. 1 District Council was adjourned to-day as a mark of respect to the memory of Mr. Richard Costelloe, a member. Mr. P. K. Hogan, J.P., Chairman, who presided, referred to the death of Mr. Costelloe in the fulness of life. He said he was a useful and energetic member of the Council, and was esteemed by everyone of his colleagues. He moved a vote of condolence with his relatives in the loss they had sustained, and the adjournment of the meeting as a tribute of respect to his memory. The resolution was seconded unanimously, and the Clerk, who associated himself with the resolution, was directed to forward a copy to the relatives of the deceased.

Albert Edward Roe, who lived with Trevan at Hove, was the principal witness at the resumption of the inquest on Thursday upon E. Trevanion, the victim of the veronal poison mystery. He was warned by the Coroner before giving evidence. He related the story of acquaintance with deceased since they met years ago on the Oratava, where he was fourth officer. After accepting the invitation to act as a companion he acquiesced in deceased's proposal to settle on him £10,000. He did all he could in Trevanion in the fatal illness, and had previously endeavoured to cure him of habits of drug taking and alcoholism, looking upon him as a brother.

THE ARKINS CASE.

Sentence to be Reduced to Three Months.

Yesterday in the House of Commons,

Mr. William Redmond drew the attention of the Chief Secretary to the sentence of seven years penal servitude passed upon a man named Arkins at the Winter Assizes in Cork on a charge of having thrown down a stone wall in the County Clare and asked Mr. Birrell if he would recommend to Lord Lieutenant to use his prerogative of mercy as the sentence was so severe.

The Chief Secretary said that the offence was not one of throwing down a wall, but that the woman whose property had been damaged had been subjected to annoyance for a long time. However, considering the fact that Arkins was very young man, who had borne a blameless character up to now, he would recommend to Lord Lieutenant to liberate him when he has spent three months in prison.

LIMERICK INDUSTRIAL ASSOCIATION.

The usual weekly Committee meeting was held in the office, 62 George Street, on Thursday evening.

Arising out of the Association's correspondence with Baron Von Horst re the supplying by him free hop plants to any farmer wishing to start a profitable industry of hop growing, as recently reported in the Press, several applications for supply of hop roots were read from farmers in different parts of this district.

It is the intention of the Association to take up with those applicants, and arrange that supply of hop roots be sent them.

The Women's Branch of the Industrial Association has been amalgamated with the Men's Branch the two now constituting the Limerick Industrial Association, which step will tend to develop the work of the organisation.
