He reported the matter to the police, and the defendants were arrested late last night. The defendants were remanded on bail for eight days.

PUBLIC AMUSEMENTS.

Theatre Royal.

The man with the broken blood-vessel was I; one of the others was Scott, and the other was Dr. Wilson."
