THE SHANNON SALMON FISHERIES.

Several large salmon were on view yesterday after capture in the Shannon. At the Yarmouth Fish Stores, William street, a fine spring salmon was exhibited, its weight being 39 lbs., while at Mr. Denis Hayes's mart in Roche's street, there were a number of large salmon displayed, one being labelled as scaling 45 lbs.

Yesterday, at Corbally, Mr. Alexander Nestor captured with rod and line a splendid salmon scaling 41 lbs. It was on view to-day at the Yarmouth Fish Stores.

On Friday night all previous records were put aside by a capture at Tervoe. This was the netting of a spring salmon, which weighed 57 lbs., and is the heaviest spring fish taken in the Shannon for years. The fish was on view to-day at the Mart of Mr. D. Hayes's, Roche's street.

A copy of the resolution was ordered to be forwarded to Mr. Asquith.

DEATH OF LIEUT.-COL. ROBERT MAUNSELL, J.P.

We regret to record the death which occurred yesterday afternoon at his residence, 78 George street, of Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Maunsell, J.P., late 85th Light Infantry and Pembroke Depot Battalion, in the eighty-eighth year of his age. Deceased was a member of a very old Limerick family, and, like many of his predecessors, served with distinction in the Army from which he retired a quarter of a century back or more, and has since constantly resided in Limerick. He was a magistrate of the county and a grand juror, and, while his health permitted, he occupied various Diocesan offices, and was one of the trustees of the Limerick Savings Bank. He had been invalided for some years back, and his demise was not unexpected. Colonel Maunsell was highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends for his courteous and unassuming disposition. He was one of the few remaining links between the present and a generation all but passed away, and several county families are placed in mourning by his death. The funeral is announced to be private.
