

introduced amendments conferring more reasonable conditions on those licensed holders who might be deprived of their livelihood under the measure. It is said, however, to be the intention of the Government to carry the Bill in its original form under the Parliament Act. The amendments to the Trade Unions Bill do not, it seems, meet the approval of Trade Unions, and the Labour Party are likely to bring pressure on the Government to discard the amendments made by the Lords. Then the Railway Bill is a measure of great importance and is being followed with keen interest by the Companies who object to a time limit of five years being affixed to the Bill, a clause which has been eliminated by the House of Lords, and so the decision of the House of Commons on the point at issue will be looked forward to with some anxiety. On the whole, it is evident that when the members of the House of Commons re-assemble, they may look forward to entering on another Session of a very arduous and, doubtless, protracted nature.

SUDDEN DEATHS

In the City.

Very much regret is felt with the relatives of Mr. Michael Tuite, who died somewhat suddenly at his residence on Thursday evening. The deceased, who was an upholsterer, and member of the Garryowen Football Club in its early days, was present at the match for the Munster Junior Cup on Thursday afternoon. He had been ill for some time past, and towards the close of the game he decided on returning home where he got gradually worse, expiring shortly after his arrival. On Thursday night Patrick McDonnell, employed at Mr. John Byrne's Sexton Street, and who had been for years with the firm, was returning with a van man to the stores when he became unwell. He was at once attended to and conveyed with all despatch to Barrington's Hospital, but on arrival at the institution, life was found to be extinct. Yesterday morning Patrick Walsh, a carter from Mary Street, was admitted to Barrington's Hospital, suffering from an apoplectic attack. He received every attention but he died about noon, the case from the first being hopeless.

Inquest,

Mr. J. F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital this morning as to the death of Patrick McDonnell, at Sexton Street, on Thursday night.

Sergeant McCarthy, William Street, conducted the inquiry, and Mr. J. Dodd, Solr., attended on behalf of the Insurance Company.

A jury, of which Mr. James Halvey was foreman having been sworn, a number of witnesses were examined.

The Coroner and the jury complimented Lance Corporal William Clarke, Royal Engineers, on the intelligent manner in which he had given his evidence, and on his commendable action in giving all the assistance possible to Mr. McDonnell, and the vanman at the time of the occurrence.

Dr. John Holmes, Resident Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, who, with Dr. P. F. Graham, made a *post-mortem* examination, stated that death was due to syncope, resulting from heart disease.

The jury found in accordance with the medical testimony.

THE SHANNON SALMON FISHERIES.

Several large salmon were on view yesterday after capture in the Shannon. At the Yarmouth Fish Stores, William street, a fine spring salmon was exhibited, its weight being 39lbs., while at Mr. Denis Hayes's mart in Roche's street, there were a number of large salmon displayed, one being labelled as scaling 45lbs.

Yesterday, at Corbally, Mr. Alexander Nestor captured with rod and line a splendid salmon scaling 41 lbs. It was on view to-day at the Yarmouth Fish Stores.

On Friday night all previous records were put aside by a capture at Tervoe. This was the netting of a spring salmon, which weighed 57 lbs., and is the heaviest spring fish taken in the Shannon for years. The fish was on view to-day at the Mart of Mr. D. Hayes's, Roche's street.
