## FATAL ACCIDENT AT BALLINACURRA.

What proved a fatal accident occurred at Ballinacurra on Saturday afternoon. Two men—Patrick Sheehan and Michael Corbett—were driving into town from Adare, and just approaching Ballinacurra Bridge the horse took fright, and Corbett, who was seated on one side of the car, jumped off, falling on his back, and sustaining injuries which proved fatal subsequently, though at first the man did not realise he was seriously hurt, nor did he present the appearance of being such. After he fell off the car Sheehan was able to hold his seat for some little distance, but close to the entrance to Mr. McDonnell's residence at Ballinacurra he too was thrown off the car, and sustained a fracture of the leg. Mrs. McDonnell had him kindly conveyed in her motor car to the County Infirmary, and Corbett was also attended to by some people passing into the city, one of whom conveyed him by car to town, with the view of going into hospital for treatment. Corbett, however, did not do so, and it was not until some hours later on that he was found again at Ballinacurra, whence he was brought in the ambulance to Barrington's Hospital, where he died at nine o'clock on Saturday night. Evidently the man was quite unaware of his condition, which, after he had walked about for some time, ended in his becoming unconscious, that being his state when admitted to Barrington's. He was for some hours after the accident, apparently sensible, and those who noticed him towards evening were told by Corbett he was waiting for a car to bring him home. He gradually, however, became dazed, and coma threatening the ambulance was sent for, as stated, and he was conveyed to hospital, continuing unconscious until he died.

### The Inquest.

An inquest was held last evening at Barrington's hospital as to the cause of death.

Acting Sergeant Crowley, Ballinacurra station, conducted the inquiry.

After hearing the evidence the jury found that death resulted from the injuries accidentally sustained, on the occasion of the occurrence.
