THE LATE MR. P. J. NOLAN, K.C.

The city of Calgary, Canada, in which Mr. P. J. Nolan, K.C., a brilliant Limerickman, practised for the last 23 years, and where he died on the 10th of this month, paid a marked tribute to the eminence which he had attained in his pro-fession, and as a member of the Senate of the University of Alberta, as well as his status and worth as a citizen, and his great personal popularity, by giving him the honour of a public funeral. It was attended by practically the entire population of the city, which, the papers to hand say, never on any occasion of the death of a public man showed such manifestation. a public man showed such manifestation of general regret.
