### Peace Prospects

### CITY TECHNICAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The Mayor presided at the meeting of the City  
 Technical Education Committee last night.  
 Present were also present—Miss Doyle, Rev.  
 Canon Adderley, Very Rev. Canon Murphy,  
 Messrs J. Cronin, P. Walsh, B.C.; P.  
 M. B.C., and E. J. Long, with the Secretary  
 Assistant Secretary. Arising out of a report  
 submitted by the Secretary, it was decided un-  
 animously to discontinue the senior class for in-  
 struction in plumbing, in consequence of inadequate  
 facilities. A communication was received from  
 lace purveyors calling attention to the  
 difficulty experienced in procuring a sufficient  
 quantity of Limerick lace, and requesting the  
 committee to start a class for instruction in lace-  
 making. After a conversation it was agreed to  
 consider the application pending enquiries as to the  
 possibility of establishing such a class.

His Lordship affirmed the decree of the Court  
 below, with £3 8s. 6d., costs of the appeal, and

The County Council appealed against a decree  
 of the County Court Judge for £340, in a claim by  
 Dr. S. M. Hynes, for £600 compensation for  
 the burning and destruction of a dwelling-house,  
 known as Sans Souci, at Lisnard, County District  
 of Lisdoonvarna, on April 12th. £40 costs and  
 £20 expenses had been awarded below.

Eventually his Lordship increased the award  
 to £420, with £15 15s. costs, and £10 3s.  
 expenses.

Colonel O'Callaghan-Westropp appealed against  
 a decision of the County Court Judge giving a  
 decree for £2 in a claim for £35 compensation  
 for the driving of thirty head of cattle and  
 knocking down of 85 yards of wall and a gate at  
 Fortane in September last.

His Lordship said £2 for the knocking down of  
 the wall was totally absurd. He raised the  
 amount to £10. He awarded £3 8s. 6d. costs, in  
 addition to £2 16s. 3d. costs below, and 10s.  
 expenses here and 15s. expenses below.

Colonel O'Callaghan-Westropp also appealed  
 against a decision of County Court Bodkin giving  
 a decree for £1 in a claim for £5 compensation for  
 knocking down three perches of demesne wall on  
 Nov. 7, at Fortane.

In another appeal the award of the County  
 Court Judge was £1 in a claim by Colonel  
 O'Callaghan-Westropp for £6 compensation for  
 knocking down 17 yards of demesne wall at  
 Fortane, on Oct. 6th or 7th.

In the first case his Lordship raised the amount  
 to £3, with £3 8s. 6d. costs of appeal, and in the  
 last case he increased the award to £5, with costs  
 of £3 8s. 6d.

### DEATH OF DR. E. L. AHERIN, HERNSBROOK.

We regret extremely to announce the death of  
 Dr. E. Lloyd Aherin, of HERNSBROOK, County  
 Limerick, which took place yesterday morning at  
 Newcastle West. The deceased gentleman, who  
 was second son of the late Mr. William Aherin,  
 was a member of an old county family, and his  
 kindly and courteous manner, and solicitude  
 for the sick poor, won for him the highest respect  
 and esteem of all classes and creeds in West  
 Limerick. Some ten days ago he contracted  
 typhoid fever, and despite all that medical skill  
 could do, he passed away at the compara-  
 tively early age of 52 years, to the deep regret  
 of a wide circle of friends and the public at large.  
 The funeral took place to-day at Springfield.
