The Press Association says—Col. Sir Joseline Fitzroy Bagot, Bart., Unionist member of Parliament for the Kendal division of Westmoreland, died this morning. Deceased was aged 59.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN NORRIS BROWNING.

A very wide circle of friends in Limerick and the surrounding counties will regret to learn of the death of Mr. John Norris Browning, of Bruree House, which took place last night, at a Nursing Home in London in the 60th year of his age. Mr. Browning, who was the fourth son of the late Mr. T. W. Browning Carass Court, was a member of an old and well-known sporting family. He himself was a keen sportsman, and succeeding in 1906 his uncle the late Mr. John Gubbins, whose name loomed so prominently in the racing world, he kept up the extensive stud at Bruree for several years until his health eventually gave way. One of his horses was the well-known "Prospector," who as a two-year old carried off several important races in England. Mr. Browning was one of the most generous and liberal-hearted of men, and by rich and poor alike he was held in the highest respect and esteem. He took an active concern in Church affairs, and was a generous contributor to the diocesan funds. His premature demise has cast a gloom over the districts of Croom and Bruree, where he was so familiar and popular a personality. The funeral will take place on Monday next at 12.30 o'clock from his late residence for interment at Bruree churchyard.
