FUNERAL OF MR. WILLIAM LLOYD.

The funeral of an old and highly respected citizen, the late Mr. William Lloyd, whose death occurred in a Private Home, Dublin, on Monday evening, took place yesterday morning, for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. On Tuesday the remains, which were enclosed in a polished oaken casket, were conveyed by the 3 o'clock train from Kingsbridge and arrived in Limerick at 7.15. They were met at the terminus by a large concourse of mourners and taken to St. Munchin's R.C. Church where they rested overnight. Yesterday morning Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated for the dead and was attended by a large congregation. At the close of the service the coffin was taken out and the funeral procession formed up. The line of route taken was by the old town, Patrick Street, George Street, and William Street to the last resting place. On the way and as the cortege passed, the various business houses were closed. The cortege was of immense proportions and representative of the various interests in the city and county. In the procession were members of the Corporation, Chamber of Commerce, and the other city Boards. The attendance was a striking testimony to the esteem entertained for the deceased gentleman by the citizens of every class and creed.
