DEATH OF A POST OFFICE OFFICIAL

We regret extremely to announce the death of
Mr. David Gleeson, Overseer of the Telegraph
Department of the Limerick Post Office, at his
residence yesterday morning. Mr. Gleeson, who
was a native of Queenstown, and in his fifty-
eighth year, had been at business up to a few days
since, but although not feeling quite so well
there were no indications that he was seriously
ill. He went off duty for a brief holiday, and he
was about on Thursday in his usual health, which,
however, was not robust. Yesterday
morning he complained of being rather unwell,
and some short time afterwards the end came
peacefully to the great grief of his family. For
the past quarter of a century Mr. Gleeson did
duty at Limerick, and there could not well be in
any public department a more obliging, courteous,
and kindly official. This had come long since to
be generally recognised by the public as well as
by his colleagues, and there is in the sad circum-
stances of his premature demise the deepest
sympathy with the widow and family of the
lamented deceased. The intelligence of his death
came as a painful surprise to his many friends and
acquaintances, and outside the family circle none
were more touched by the regrettable event than
the staff, of all grades, at the Limerick Post
Office with whom Mr. Gleeson had served so
loyally and for so extended a period.

The remains will be removed from his late
residence, Catherine Street, to St. Michael's R.C.
Church, at 9.30 to-night, and the funeral will
take place at 3 p.m. to-morrow.

DEATH OF DR. H. CUSACK.

His many friends in the city and county learned
with deep regret of the death of Dr. Harry
Cusack, which took place in Birmingham on
Tuesday night. He was son of Mr. S. Cusack,
Clare Street, and enjoyed a wide practice in
Birmingham. The remains arrived in Limerick
on Thursday morning, and, after Requiem Mass
at St. John's Cathedral, the interment took place
in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The funeral
was of considerable dimensions, and testified to
the esteem entertained for deceased and the
members of his family in the city. A melancholy
feature in connection with the somewhat un-
expected demise of Dr. Cusack was that he was
about to leave Birmingham in the course of a
week or so to take up the duties of Medical
Officer of the Peamount Sanatorium, Co. Dublin,
a position which he secured by competitive
examination from amongst fifty candidates.
