## FUNERAL OF MR. DAVID GLEESON.

The funeral of the late Mr. David Gleeson, Telegraph Overseer at the Limerick Post Office, and whose premature death is so greatly regretted, took place on Sunday afternoon from St. Michael's R.C. Church, for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. Mr. Gleeson, as stated in our obituary notice of Saturday, was a native of Queenstown, but his connexion with official duty in Limerick extended over a quarter of a century, and he was very popular with all classes, his colleagues, and the general public. Evidence of this was amply afforded at the funeral on Sunday, the attendance being the largest seen for many years, and representative of all sections of the people with whom Mr. Gleeson was deservedly such a favourite. The funeral started from the church shortly after three o'clock, and following the hearse came a number of telegraph messengers attired in their official uniforms, and bearing wreaths, an arrangement which was at once saddening in the circumstances and complimentary in a very touching degree. The procession extended the full length of William street, and was closed by a long line of carriages and private conveyances. ## LONDON SENSATION

### Attempt to Blow up of England

#### Bomb Discovered

A sensational discovery was made in London yesterday afternoon. A bomb was discovered in the hands of a London policeman on duty in the Strand, on the eastern side of the bank, just inside the railings close to the Royal Exchange. He picked up the bomb while examining it, noticed the receipt. The constable took the bomb to the fountain outside the Royal Exchange, and threw the can into the water. He then took the bomb to the police station, where it was examined. It was found that the can was part of a scientific bomb.

Examination showed it contained a few ounces of gunpowder, a quantity of dynamite, a small electric battery with a small electric wire, a small chronometer, and a small battery, to explode the bomb.

Subsequently the bomb was examined by Home Office experts for examination. A search was made by detectives in the neighbourhood of the building.

Up to a late hour no arrest had been made in connection with the discovery.
