Justice Cherry, an application by way of appeal was made in the case of Ryan v. O'Mears. The plaintiff was Miss Margaret Ryan, daughter of a farmer residing near Nenagh, Co., Tipperary, and she sued Stephen O'Meara, son of a farmer, living near Moneygall, in the same neighbourhood, to recover damages for an alleged breach of promise of marriage.
