

SUDDEN DEATH.

Mr. James F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, held an inquest on Monday as to the death of Patrick Noonon, a carpenter, who resided in the Edward street district. He had not been well for some time past, and on Monday at the dinner hour the illness took a fatal turn. A verdict of death from natural causes was returned.

LARCENY FROM A CHURCH.

"FREE SPEECH" DEMONSTRATION.

At the close of a "free speech" demonstration in Trafalgar Square, London, on Sunday afterncon, an attempt by an unauthorised speaker to address a meeting from a prohibited portion of the Nelson Column plinth led to a conflict between the police and the crowd, resulting in the arrest of five men on a charge of obstructing and as ault. The mounted police cleared the streets, and there were wild scenes of disorder for time time. Many persons received alight injuries.

SUICIDE IN CLARE.

On Tuesday, Mr. Jas. Lynch, Solr., Coroner for North Clare, held an inquest at Booltiaghdine, near Corofin, on the remains of a farmer named Martin Collins, who was found hanging on Monday ina stable.

The widow's evidence was that the deceased went out about 6 on Monday morning to get some potatoes. She went out about a quarter offan hour after, and as she passed the stable she law the body suspended from the beams of the roof. She called neighbours and the body was cut down. but the unfortunate man was quite dead. He had been strange in his manner for some time.

The usual verdict was found.
