SUDDEN DEATH.

from natural causes was returned.

"FREE SPEECH" DEMONSTRATION.

At the close of a "free speech" demonstration
in Trafalgar Square, London, on Sunday after-
noon, an attempt by an unauthorised speaker to

the Nelson Column plinth led to a conflict between
the police and the crowd, resulting in the arrest of
five men on a charge of obstructing and assault.
The mounted police cleared the streets, and there
were wild scenes of disorder for time time. Many
persons received slight injuries.

SUICIDE IN CLARE.

On Tuesday, Mr. Jas. Lynch, Solr., Coroner for
North Clare, held an inquest at Booltiaghine,
near Corofin, on the remains of a farmer named
Martin Collins, who was found hanging on Monday
ina stable.

The widow's evidence was that the deceased
went out about 6 on Monday morning to get some
potatoes. She went out about a quarter of an
hour after, and as she passed the stable she saw
the body suspended from the beams of the roof.
She called neighbours and the body was cut down,
but the unfortunate man was quite dead. He had
been strange in his manner for some time.

The usual verdict was found.
