The handball season opened on Sunday at the Ball-court, Rutland-street, where a large gathering assembled to witness the match down for disposal. Mr. James Flynn, member of committee, referred to the President, Alderman Joyce, M.P., as an old exponent of the game, and the President then spoke to the assembly. Bowles and Bourke won by four games to one for their opponents. Mr. Bowles, it was stated, was ready to defend his position of All-Ireland Champion, and on the form he showed in the match on Sunday he should take a lot of play against any comer.

HUMAN REMAINS EXPOSED.

Presumed Siege Relics.

While excavating at the Limerick Hay Market yesterday, some workmen came upon the remains of two bodies presumed to have been interred there about the time of the Williamite Siege. One of the skeletons, or what remained of it, was laid as if regularly interred, the other appeared to have been buried somewhat hurriedly. There was a hole in the side of the skull, within which a bullet was found, thereby showing that death was due to violence, and the remains those of a soldier killed at the siege. The unsuccessful assault of King William's army was made within some three hundred yards from where the remains were discovered yesterday.
