DEAD MEAT INDUSTRY.

The Association then took up the question of the establishment of a dead meat industry. Mr. Browne related what took place recently at a meeting called to consider the matter in Dublin. To his mind the establishment of such an industry in this country was very much needed in order to counteract the scourge of foot and mouth disease which was hanging over the country. If the industry were established it would make the country independent of that disease. The promoters had come to an agreement with the Smithfield people in London, who had undertaken to receive a thousand beasts weekly. They would give better prices for them than the farmers could obtain for beasts on foot. Dublin was starting an abattoir of their own, and he (Mr. Browne) put in a claim for Limerick, and was told by the Chairman of the meeting that Dublin would not possibly be able to manage the dead meat trade of Ireland, and would require the assistance of four or five other abattoirs in Ireland. That showed that Limerick could have its own abattoir, and co-operate in the general scheme. It would be to the benefit of Limerick that such a thing were accomplished, as they would be able to get the same transit facilities and good prices for cattle as the Dublin suppliers. He proposed the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Cooper, and passed unanimously:—"That we the members of the County Limerick and Clare Farmers' Association, having considered the matter of the Irish Abattoirs, Ltd., approve of the scheme, and will help in making it a success by securing shareholders and supporters." The meeting then adjourned.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN KIELY.

We regret to record the death which took place at his residence, Upper Glentworth Street, yesterday, of Mr. John Kiely, at a ripe age. The deceased, who was a well-known and respected citizen, carried on an extensive bakery business in Patrick Street, and afterwards at Sarsfield Street, for a number of years.
