### DROWNING FATALITY.

#### Young Hero the Victim.

Mr. J. F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, held an  
inquest to-day respecting the death of William  
Davern, aged nine, who was accidentally drowned  
in a pond off Carey's Road last evening. The  
deceased lad was in the afternoon fishing in the  
pond from the bank with some other boys, one of  
whom, John Killeen, accidentally fell into the  
water. Davern, with great pluck, went to  
Killeen's rescue, and in a moment the two boys  
were struggling in the water. The cries for  
assistance of the boys on the bank attracted  
some men to the scene, and Killeen was helped  
ashore. Davern had by this time unhappily  
sank, and it was not until a boat had been  
procured and a search made that the little  
fellow's body was recovered. The jury having  
heard the evidence returned a verdict of acciden-  
tal drowning, adding an expression of sympathy  
with the relatives of the deceased at the sad  
occurrence.
