mourned by the residents of that district.

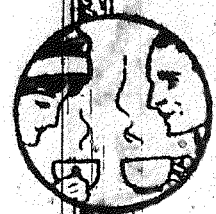
COAL IN GLIN DISTRICT

on the motion of Mr G. Frost, seconded by Mr
J. Moroney—"That we the Limerick No. 2
District Council, representing one of the most
peaceful and law-abiding portions of Clare,
respectfully submit to His Excellency the Lord
Lieutenant that we anxiously await the exercise
of his prerogative of mercy in mitigation of the
sentence of imprisonment on the young farmers
from the Carrahan district found guilty of riot at
the last Munster Winter Assizes. The hardship
inflicted on the prisoners, and those depending on
them, by the long term of imprisonment already
served by them, has more than atoned for their
connection with a conflict which was unpre-
meditated, and as the district is now in a peaceable
condition we trust our appeal for the imprisoned
men will not be in vain. That a copy of the
resolution be sent to the Lord Lieutenant."
