Agricultural Commission were in Limerick on Thursday, and inspected the Drombanna Co-operative Creamery, and the premises of the Irish Co-operative Agency Society at the Roxboro Road. The party were accompanied by Mr. T. Wibberley, late Agricultural Instructor to the County of Limerick. Agricultural and Technical Instruction Committee. They arrived the previous night, and stayed at the Glentworth Hotel, proceeding on Thursday morning to Drombanna and making a minute inspection of the creamery. On their return they visited the Irish Co-operative Agency Society's premises, where the manager, Mr D. L. Roche, J.P, received them and provided the members of the party with interesting details of the operations and working of the Society. The visitors spent the day in the city, proceeding by the evening train to Cork and Queenstown, where they embarked yesterday on their homeward voyage to New York.

TRAGIC ACCIDENT IN WEST LIMERICK.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

Mrs. Hanlon, wife of Thomas Hanlon, labourer, Shanagolden, Co. Limerick, received a fearful shock on Tuesday morning when, on returning from performing some kind offices for an ailing friend, she found her three children—two boys and a girl—dead in their beds, having been smothered by dense smoke, caused by smouldering fagots, which ignited the kitchen furniture. On leaving the cottage half an hour previously she gave her children their breakfast and closed the door, there being a quarry near by which they might have fallen into.

Dr. Ambrose, Coroner, held an inquest. Dr. Nolan, Shanagolden, testified to death being caused by asphyxiation.

The jury found in accordance with medical testimony, and expressed deepest sympathy with the bereaved parents.

The Coroner said not the slightest blame was attached to the mother.

The interment took place at Kilfergus Churchyard, Glin, and the sad and impressive spectacle of the three coffins at the head of the large funeral procession heightened the feelings of sorrow evoked by the calamity. The victims' ages ranged from 6 years to 15 months.

Four men—Maurice and John Landers, Thomas O'Donnell, and Michael Lee—were seriously injured by a blasting accident near Lismore. John Landers' thumb was blown off, and all the men received facial and bodily injuries for which they are under treatment in Lismore Infirmary.

A representative meeting of the general public was recently held at the Central Hotel, Borrisokane, for the purpose of expressing regret at the departure of Mr. M. F. Liston from Borrisokane, and congratulating him on his well-merited promotion to the Killarney branch of the Munster and Leinster Bank.

The resignation by Mr J. Glynn, of the Town Clerkship of Tuam, which he has held for the past twenty years, has caused much regret among the Town Commissioners and the townpeople. 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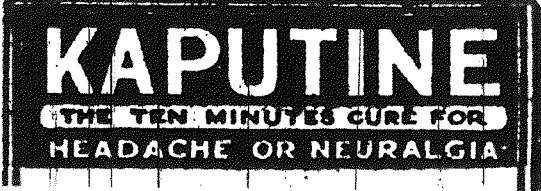
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
