WELSH CHURCH BILL.

Lord Londonderry, writing to The Times on the Welsh Church Bill debate in the House of Lords, says:—Lord Lansdowne, in the House of Lords last evening, during the debate in the Welsh Disestablishment Bill, drew attention to the provisions of Clause 6 of Lord (then Mr.) Morley's Evicted Tenants Bill of 1894. I do not find his reference reported, and as the proposal seems to me to have a considerable bearing on the present situation, I venture to recall it. The clause proposed to allocate £250,000 of Irish Church money for the purpose of compensating men who had been described by an Irish judge as criminal and fraudulent bankrupts. Surely, with this experience, the English people should be warned of the manner in which the Welsh Church funds may be used.

DEATH OF COLONEL S. B. HUNT.
