

Captain Thomas William Sanders, J.C., of Sallow Glen, Ennis-road, Limerick, and of Sallow Glen, Tarbert, Co. Kerry, Ireland, barrister-at-law for some years a captain in the Kerry Militia, High Sheriff for County Kerry in 1885, had bred several prize shorthorn cattle, and the first to start a creamery in North Kerry for the benefit of his tenantry, and who died on 17th February last; aged 70 years, left a real estate in the United Kingdom valued at £8,534 16s. 2d., of which £605 is in England. Probate of his will, dated July, 1904, has been granted to his daughter, Mrs. Amy Margaret Finch, of Sallow Glen, Tarbert, probate having been renounced by his wife, Mrs. Sarah Amy Sanders, and his son-in-law, Mr. John Kinahan. The testator left his household effects to his wife, Mrs. Sarah Amy Sanders, for her life, with remainder to his daughter, Amy Margaret, absolutely; and whereas he had bequeathed one-half of his lands, etc., at Sallow Glen on trust for his daughter, Eva Maud Sarah Anne Kinahan, wife of John Kinahan, the testator now bequeathed the other moiety of such lands, etc., to his daughter Amy Margaret, and the residue of his property he left to his said daughter, Amy Margaret, absolutely.

BANNATYNES' EXCURSION.

PROVINCIAL BANK OF IRELAND.

Yesterday the usual general half-yearly meeting of the shareholders of the Provincial Bank of Ireland was held in the Shelbourne Hotel, under the presidency of the Hon. W. H. Goschen. The deposits now amount to over six millions sterling—the highest sum yet reached in the history of the bank. On the half year's working there was an increase of £5,382 in the gross profits as compared with the figures of a year ago. A dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. was ordered to be paid, and the shareholders expressed satisfaction with the manner in which the concern had been worked.

WELSH CHURCH BILL.

Lord Londonderry, writing to *The Times* on the Welsh Church Bill debate in the House of Lords, says:—Lord Lansdowne, in the House of Lords last evening, during the debate on the Welsh Disestablishment Bill, drew attention to the provisions of Clause 6 of Lord (then Mr.) Morley's Evicted Tenants Bill of 1894. I do not find his reference reported, and as the proposal seems to me to have a considerable bearing on the present situation, I venture to recall it. The clause proposed to allocate £250,000 of Irish Church money for the purpose of compensating men who had been described by an Irish judge as criminal and fraudulent bankrupts. Surely, with this experience, the English people should be warned of the manner in which the Welsh Church funds may be used.

DEATH OF COLONEL S. B. HUNT.

We regret to have to announce the death to-day of Colonel Samuel Bradshaw Hunt, late of the Indian Medical Service, at his residence, 75 George-street. The deceased gentleman who was in his seventy-second year, retired from the service twelve years since, the last four of which he spent in Limerick. He was a member of a well-known and much-esteemed County Limerick family, and his demise, after an illness of some duration, is deeply regretted by his relatives and friends. Colonel Hunt leaves an only son, who is a Judge in Southern India.
