## OUTRAGE AT WESTMINSTER ABBEY.

Twenty militant Suffragettes visited Westminster Abbey on Sunday morning, and during the recital of the Commandments chanted their "Prayer" for Mrs Pankhurst. The disturbance followed closely on the lines of that at St. Paul's last Sunday. In this case, however, the women were not grouped together, but occupied seats on both sides of the aisle. As soon as the women commenced chanting "Save Emmeline Pankhurst, save her, save her," the vergers requested them either to desist or quietly leave the Abbey. As they refused, they were escorted from the building. The incident did not interrupt the service. No arrests were made.

## LIMERICK AND THE ARMY MANOEUVRES.

The army manoeuvres in Ireland this year, will cover a much wider area than has hitherto been the case. Included in the sphere of operations, is a considerable portion of the South, with Limerick as an important base. The manoeuvres commence this month, and by the middle of September the opposing forces will be in the vicinity of Limerick. Attached to the sections are members of the Royal Army Flying Corps, who will afford exhibitions in Limerick as in other centres.

## SUDDEN DEATH.

Mrs Nealon, 68, died suddenly on Tuesday morning at her residence, Edward-street. She was only after getting out of her bed when she was seized with a fainting fit, and died in a short time. For some time past she had suffered from heart affection, and this fact having been communicated by the police, to the Coroner, he did not consider an inquest necessary.

## BELFAST DISTURBANCE.

At Belfast on Monday night two hundred and fifty excursionists belonging to the Belfast Branch of the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union, on returning from Portrush, were met by a hostile crowd, who greeted them with showers of stones and revolver shots. One girl was slightly injured. The excursionists were got away from the station by side exits, and the projected procession was abandoned. No arrests were made.

### MOTOR ACCIDENTS.

At Grimsby, on Saturday, Edna Vallow, aged six, was fatally injured through being knocked down by a motor car while running along the road.

At Bolton Le Sands, on Saturday, Elsie Bentley, aged four, of Leeds, who was on a visit to Morecambe with her parents, was accidentally knocked down by a motor car and fatally injured.

The body of a middle-aged man, well-dressed, was brought to Newmarket mortuary on Saturday through a wrecked bicycle. A chauffeur named Smart stated that he saw deceased cycling and sounded his horn. Deceased looked round, and then passed immediately in front of the car. The chauffeur made every effort to avoid him, but failed, and the car struck the deceased.
