THE ICE SCOUT, SCOTIA.

After patrolling the Atlantic for nearly five months, the old Dundee whaler Scotia, which was transformed into an iceberg scout, has again reached the Tay. One of the scientific staff denounced the reports of the failure of the mission as utter nonsense, and asserted that not only had the voyage been successful, but much valuable data had been compiled. The Scotia was not intended to keep in wireless touch with every transatlantic liner. The real purpose was to watch the breaking up of the pack ice, and observe the movement of the floes. That work was accomplished, and now the whereabouts of bergs would probably be discovered by studying the atmospheric conditions governing ocean currents carrying the ice.

FALL OF A CAGE.

PEACE CONGRESS.

President Wilson Thanked

Hague, Saturday

The Peace Conference concluded to-day resolved to thank the President of the U States for his attitude towards pacif and agreed to a resolution t the American Government not to fortify Panama Canal. The Congress also adopt resolution expressing the wish that the International Bureau and Peace Societies enter into permanent communication with Press in general. It declared in favour o pleting an institution of arbitration by givin parties to a dispute the option of arrivin settlement by amicable arrangement.

IRISH POSTAL CLERKS AND REPORT.

Committee's Findings Reject

At a specially convened meeting of the N Executive of the Association of Irish Post Clerks held in Dublin yesterday, the fol resolution was unanimously adopted:—

That we regard with the utmost dissatis the failure of the Holt Committee to grant crease in the present wages of sorting cler telegraphists and telephonists, and, in view Committee's admission, that retail prices ha by 13.7 per cent. since 1905, we claim that less than a corresponding increase in wages meet our immediate demands; that such crease would be regardless of the growing of complexity of our work, and regardless, the fact that even in 1905 the wages of officials were far from adequate.

That in the matter of promotion, the C tee's recommendations give increased facili the advancement of favouritism, and are n satisfactory.
