able. The strike leaders declare if an agreement
is not reached on the lines of their proposals an
effort will be made to extend the strike.

Position at Birmingham Unchanged.

The strike position at Birmingham is practically
unchanged this morning. There is some dis-
organisation of suburban traffic. Traders are
removing perishable commodities, and strike
pickets posted at large goods depots are exercising
very strict scrutiny.

The London and North-Western Railway Com-
pany to-day announced that they cannot accept
traffic for their Birmingham goods stations until
further notice, owing to their men at those stations
having ceased work.

STRIKE COMMITTEE'S ACTION ENDORSED.

At a mass meeting of the strikers to-day it was
announced by a member of the Strike Committee
that the Executive Committee had endorsed
their action. The Organising Secretary made a
similar announcement.

£25 to the other.

The Chairman—It is the fact. I have
figures before me.

Mr Barry thought that the doctors who had
exceeded the maximum service should, *de facto*
receive the maximum salary at once.

Mr Vere de Vere repeated that, as far as he was
concerned, the matter was not a personal one.
Principle only guided his actions.

Mr Cahill—No one is disputing that the doctors
are not worthy of some concession.

Mr Cusack—Why not give it to them. How
many years service has Dr O'Brien?

Dr O'Brien—Forty-one years, and according
to Mr Casey I will never reach it.

Mr Cusack—And how many years service has
Dr Nolan?

Dr Nolan—Thirty-eight years.
Mr Casey moved as an amendment the rejection
of the part of the resolution affecting the Medi-
cal Officers whose service had exceeded the prescrib-
ed maximum.

Mr Cahill seconded.
Mrs O'Brien remarked that if the matter con-
cerned Dr Hayes, Mr Casey would not object.

Mr Casey hotly retorted that the objection
was unworthy of Mrs O'Brien, and asked that it
be withdrawn.

IRISH NAMES IN U. S. DISASTER

In connection with the Bar Harbour ex-
press disaster on the New York, New Haven, and
Hartford Railroad on September 2nd, where
the train in question was rammed by a section
of the White Mountain express near New
Haven, the name occurred among the dead
Miss Murphy, and among the injured are men-
tioned:—Frank Condon, Secretary, M. C.
Taunton, N.J., leg and forehead cut, and
injured; J Griffin, Lincoln Avenue, Orange, N.
Haven, head cut; Miss Margaret Murphy, North
Broad Street, Philadelphia, scalp wound; and M.
Katherine Sweeney, described as an employe
of Moody's camp.
