DEATH OF MR. H. M. LEFROY.

In the death of Mr. Henry Maunsell Lefroy, at
his residence, Fern Hollow, Killaloe, there has
passed away a very old citizen of Limerick. He
was a magistrate for both Co. Clare and Co.
Tipperary, and as far as can be traced was the
oldest officer living in one of the old Battalions of
the Connaught Rangers. He held a Captain's
Commission in the early forties, and was A.D.C.
to General Viscount Lorton, Rockingham, Boyle.
A curious event happened in his early days, he was
in the Secretary's Office, Post Office, and the
then Postmaster-General, the Marquis of Clan-
ricarde got him a Commission in the Indian Army.
When his Commission was being signed, the then
Chairman of the old East Indian Company died
suddenly. Mr. Lefroy then abandoned the idea
of this Service. He afterwards was a partner with
his brother-in-law in the Limerick Distillery. He
was a nephew of the late Lord Chief Justice
Lefroy, who was for many years M.P. for Trinity
College, Dublin. The deceased gentleman, and
Mr. S. E. Lee, were the Church Wardens of St.
Mary's Cathedral during the restoration and large
expenditure thereon by the late Bishop Bunbury.

The remains of the late Mr. Henry Maunsell
Lefroy, J.P., were interred this afternoon in the
cemetery attached to St. Mary's Cathedral. At
half-past twelve the funeral left Killaloe, and
notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather
there was a large gathering of mourners present.
The city was reached at half-past two. The
remains were laid to rest at the western end of
the sacred edifice, after the service, which was
conducted by the Rev. Canon Archdall, Killaloe.

Shine (nephews); and Mr J. H. Lane (nephew-in-
law).

BANKING STATISTICS OF IRELAND

A New Record.

The banking, railway, and shipping stati
for June, 1913, issued on Thursday by
Department of Agriculture and Technical Ins
tion, show that the deposits and cash balanc
joint stock banks amounted on the 30th Jun
to £60,144,000, being the highest amount
June of which there is record, and £2,392,0
excess of that for June, 1912. Comparing
deposits and cash balances since June, 1893,
the exception of a decrease in June, 1897,
has been a gradual increase from £34,637,0
June, 1893, to £60,144,000 in June, 1913.

These figures are of considerable interes
indicating the growth of the operations an
