BANKING STATISTICS OF IRELAND

A New Record.

The banking, railway, and ahipping statistics for June, 1913, issued on Thursday by the Department of Agriculture and Peobnical Instruction, show that the deposits and cash balances in joint stock banks amounted on the 30th June last to 2601,440,000, being the highest amount for June of which there is record, and £2,392,000 in excess of that for June, 1912.
