## MERICK BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

### Condolence Resolutions.

#### THE LATE MR. P. M'DONNELL.

When the minutes were read, Mr Kelly proposed the following resolution:—"That we, the members of the Limerick Board of Guardians, tender our sympathy to our respected medical officer, Mr P. McDonnell, Mrs McDonnell and family, on the death of Mr Patrick McDonnell, an old and valued member of this Board, and that we do so as a mark of respect to the memory of a colleague. That copies of this resolution be forwarded to Dr McDonnell, son, and Mrs McDonnell, widow of the deceased."

The resolution was seconded unanimously. Mr Lawlor associated himself with the vote of condolence, also the Master (Mr E. Dundon) on behalf of the officers of the Union.

#### THE LATE DEAN O'BRIEN.

Mr Lawlor said he had a resolution to propose which he felt sure would meet with the approval of the Board.
