

DEATH OF MR. P. McDONNELL, P.L.G.

We regret to have to announce the death which took place on Sunday morning at his residence, Laurel Villa, of Mr Patrick McDonnell, P.L.G., after a prolonged illness. The deceased, who was in his sixty-fifth year, was a well-known citizen, and for a long period of time took an active and somewhat prominent part in local public affairs. He was a member of the Limerick Corporation for years previous to the passing of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, and at the first election subsequent to the passing of that measure he was by a large majority elected as Alderman for the Market Ward, a position which he held until the last Municipal elections in 1911 when he did not seek a renewal of office, his son Mr M. J. McDonnell being returned in his stead as Alderman of the Ward.

LORD WILLOUGHBY DE BROKE AND CONFERENCE.

Speaking at Liverpool on Monday night on Home Rule, Lord Willoughby de Broke said before they entered into a conference their first condition would be that the whole terms of the Home Rule Bill, preamble and all, should be put behind the fire. He would enter into no conference with anybody except on the basis of the legislative union between Great Britain and Ireland.

ALLEGED SHOOTING AFFAIR IN KERRY.

At a special Court held at the police barrack in Listowel a man named Thomas Fitzgerald, a farmer, from Lyrecrumpans, was charged by Sergeant Duignan with shooting at Patrick Moloney on the 26th ult. District Inspector Walsh applied for a remand for eight days to prosecute further inquiries. The application was granted.

ANOTHER ADVANCE IN COAL PRICES.

In the October lists, the coalowners of Warwickshire, Staffordshire, Leicestershire, and Derbyshire announce an advance in prices varying from 6d. to 1s. per ton. For the best coal householders have to pay 22s. a ton, and for second sorts 19s 6d., and already the maximum prices of last winter are exceeded. Inclement weather will send prices up still further. A bigger advance is now partly prevented by the present mild spell. The new contract prices, which came into operation yesterday, are 6d. to 1s 3d. above summer contracts.

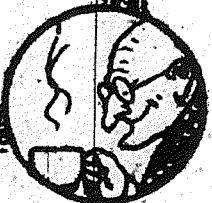

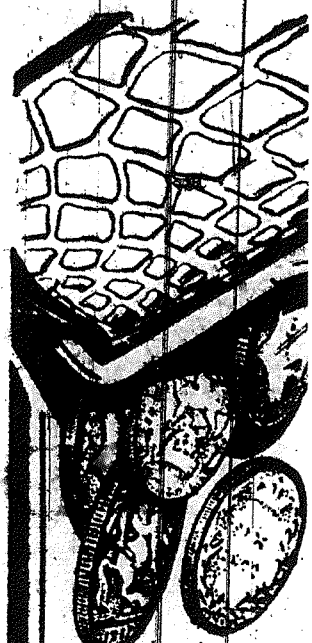
