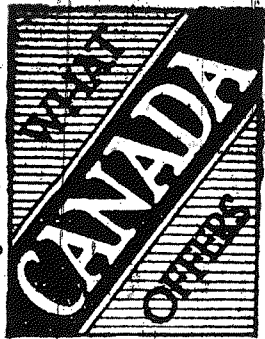

SERIOUS ASSAULT.

A serious assault took place in Kilmallock
 Workhouse on Sunday morning, as a result of
 which Patrick Hennessy, wardman, has a broken
 leg, and John Hanly, stated to be a night atten-

 grievous bodily harm. It is alleged that Hanly
 was an inmate of the workhouse for some time,

 Hanly to go to bed, but the latter used obscene
 language, and took off his coat to fight Hennessy.
 It was reported on Sunday morning that in the
 infirmary day-room Hanly attacked Hennessy and
 broke his leg in two places.

MR. BONAR LAW AND SIR E. CARSON

Mr. Bonar Law and Sir Edward Carson were en-
 tertained at luncheon at Newcastle on Thursday.
 A message was received from Mr. A. Chamberlain
 saying that never were the leaders confronted
 with a graver situation, but the Party had
 confidence in them.

Mr. Bonar Law said their ideal was to raise
 the condition of the masses, but he would rather
 spend the whole of his political life in Opposition
 than be empowered by making promises which could
 not be fulfilled.

CHARGE OF FALSE PRETENCES.

At the Guildhall, on Thursday, Emmanuel
 Biogyer, 29, merchant of South Hackney, was
 remanded on bail, charged with conspiracy to
 obtain large quantities of goods by false pretences.
 Defendant surrendered that morning, having
 arranged to do so as soon as he found the warrant
 was out. The prosecution alleged the frauds
 amounted to fifty thousand pounds, but the
 defence was that Biogyer had simply failed in
 business. During the last quarter he had paid
 twenty-three thousand to creditors.

DEATH OF MR. T. O'CONNELL.

The death to the great grief of his family and a
 large circle of friends, took place on Tuesday
 evening of Mr. Thomas O'Connell, Treaty Terrace.
 The deceased had only been ailing since Friday,
 and on Sunday medical aid was requisitioned,
 and his condition was pronounced critical. He
 was suffering from an acute attack of pneumonia,
 but it was hoped his robust condition would
 pull him through. Mr. O'Connell was engaged
 extensively in the victualling business in the
 city, and his demise is keenly regretted. The
 funeral, which was large and representative, took
 place this afternoon for Mount St. Lawrence
 Cemetery.

NORTH KERRY DROWNING FATALITY.

Dr. John Clancy, Coroner, North Kerry, held an
 inquest on Monday at noon at the Listowel Work-
 house, touching the death of a man named Patrick
 Kenny, a native of Listowel, whose body was
 found on the bank of the river Feale, at
 Tahnavalla, about a mile from the town, on the
 previous morning. There was no suspicion of
 foul play. Medical evidence was to the effect
 that death was caused by asphyxia due to
 drowning, and a verdict was returned accordingly.
