## SUNDAY CLOSING ACT AT BUNRATTY.

A Runratty publican named William F. Ryan was prosecuted at the Sixmilebridge Petty Sessions on Tuesday for infringing the Licensing Laws.

The evidence of Constable Curtin went to show that on the 26th ult. he visited the defendant's premises and tound seven men there. Four of the number lived within the three mile limit.

In cross-examination by Mr. R. Frost, Solr., the Constable stated that he was perfectly satisfied as to the distance the men resided from the public-house as he had paced it, and ascertained that the greatest distance any of them lived was 2 miles and 964 yards.

The burden of evidence given for the defence indicated, that the three men were questioned before admitted to the premises. In every instance it was stated that the men resided outside the prescribed limit, and if a doubt on the point existed, admission would be refused.

The Magistrates were satisfied with the publican's bons fides and dismissed the presecution against him, and imposed a fine of 1s and costs on the three men.

#### SUDDEN DEATH AT DROM. COLLOGHER.

Mrs Mary Quinlivan, an old age pensioner, was found dead in her house at Dromcollogher on Monday morning. For many years she had been a cripple from rheumatism.
