The funeral of the late Mr. John Kirby, victualler and pigbuyer, Charlotte Quay, took place on Tuesday, 30th ult, for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. Deceased, who was widely known in the city, had not been in the best of health for some time past, and on Sunday morning, 28th ult, he got a sudden change for the worse and passed peacefully away in a slumber. Deceased was for a number of years connected with the pigbuying trade, also with the victualling business, and was held in high esteem by his many friends, who deeply deplore his sudden demise. He was a Nationalist of the old type, and in the early days of strife was always in the forefront of the agitation. To his bereaved wife and children we tender our sincere sympathy. THE FUNERAL OBSEQUIES.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.) The funeral of the late Mrs. O'Driscoll, wife of Mr. John O'Driscoll, Postmaster, Glin, who died while undergoing an operation in a Dublin hospital, took place on Monday in the presence of a large concourse of friends and the general public, who travelled to Foynes Railway Station to meet the remains, which arrived by the morning train. The people attended to pay their last tribute to one who by her amiability and gentleness endeared herself to all, and to sympathise with her husband and children, and her parents and family and friends in their great sorrow.
